




















Yarn Garden Plates

Have children paint a paper plate half blue and half brown. Punch holes along the outside of the brown half using a hole puncher. Weave and crisscross brown yarn through the holes, creating garden dirt. Have the children decorate and then cut out the root vegetables on the template. Place the vegetables on the plate, behind the yarn. This will look like the vegetables are in the dirt.




Let-tuce Craft!

On watercolor paper, help the children squeeze random glue squiggly lines to create the illusion of lettuce leaf veins. After the glue dries, have the children paint over the glue with watercolors using shades of green and yellow. Once dried, they can freely cut leaf shapes or use the leaf template.



Dauber Fruit




Move Over, Melon!


Cherry Pom Poms!




Honeycrisp Picking







Garden Scarecrow


Fall Garden Crowns






Apple Pickers

Cut out as many apples as you would like. Tie each apple to a string and hang them with tape to a wall at the tip of children's reach, some a bit higher. The children will have to stretch and jump to grab the apples. See if they can reach a certain number of apples and then encourage teamwork to help those that have not yet met the goal.



Bubble Vegetables

Cut out vegetables for each child individually or use the whole sheet for each child. Show the children how to dip bubble wrap into paint and stamp onto the vegetables. They will love seeing the pattern come to life on their vegetables!



Flower Power

Print out the flower images. Show children beneficial flowers: butter daisies, lavender, dianthus, coneflowers, marigolds, sunflowers, zinnias and edible flowers that are considered vegetables: broccoli and cauliflower. Ask children if they have tried one of these vegetables before. Also, have children planted some of these already? Go to the garden to explore or plant beneficial or edible flowers in the garden.

The Hunt for Garden Bugs

Create a scavenger hunt using pictures of good bugs and bad bugs. Have children use magnifying lenses or toilet paper rolls to help them search for these bugs. Print out these examples of good bugs: bees, ladybugs, earthworms, green lacewings, soldier beetles, dragon fly, butterflies, and bad bugs: tomato hornworms, aphids, Japanese beetles, stinkbug, Colorado potato beetle. Show them what good bugs and bad bugs look like before they begin their search.



Print out the parts of a plant template. Place in a plastic pocket sleeve and provide different color play dough for the children to mold on top of the plant picture highlighting the different plant parts.



Use this as a resource guide to teach composting to the children in your care. As age-appropriate, create a sorting game for compostable vs non-compostable.



Other items that cannot be composted include aggressive weeds, diseased plants, treated or painted wood, and glossy paper

Composting Tip!

For a balanced compost bin, include 2-3 parts "brown materials" and 1 part "green materials."

Brown materials include: fallen leaves, twigs, shredded newspaper, wood chips and straw.

Green materials include: vegetable and fruit scraps, coffee grounds, crushed egg shells, grass clippings, tea bags (no staples) and shredded cardboard.
